Annual Report 1984

Aravind Eye Hospital in Madurai, South India is an inspiring testimony to the dedication of Dr. G. Venkataswamy and his team. They have dedicated their lives to reducing avoidable blindness. Aravind provides perhaps the finest ophthalmic care in India today. Started in 1976, under the auspices of the then formed Govel Trust, the hospital has now grown from a 20 bed facility to a 600 bed teaching hospital.

To provide high quality opthalmic care and to strengthen the teaching programme, Aravind has established collaborations with the Opthalmic Departments of University of Illinois, Chicago and St. Vincent's Hospital, New York. Aravind is also affiliated to the Madurai Kamaraj University, and its teaching programmes are approved by the Medical Council of India, and the National Academy of Medical Sciences.

Over the years, Aravind has continued to provide fuee service to 70% of its patients. This free work is done through Aravind's 350 bed free hospital and the rural eye camps. Royal Commonwealth Society for the Blind, SEVA Foundation, voluntary agencies and religious organisations provide continued support and inspiration to carry out this high volume of free work.

Expansion

Currently, Aravind is in the midst of tremendous expansion of its work. A network of satellite Eye hospitals is also being set up and many more thousands will have the gift of sight.





On the 9th of February 1984, the free section of the satellite hospital at Theni was inaugurated. The main building with a floor area of 10,000 sq.ft. is nearing completion and will be inaugurated shortly.

Now the free section is housed in a new 5 storeyed building situated adjacent to the main building. Built at a cost of Rs. 3.5 million, it has a floor area of 36,000 sq. ft. This new facility accomodates 350 in-patients, has two airconditioned operating rooms, out-patient clinic and all other support services. This is exclusively for treating free patients and was inaugurated on 7th August 1984 by Dr. Rajendra T. Vyas of (Royal Commonwealth Society for the Blind.) The top floor accommodates the nurses' quarters with all amenities and a modern kitchen with steam cooking facilities.

New Directions





On 11th June 1984, the Govel Trust started Aravind Childrens Hospital in the old free hospital building. Though it provides hospital based paediatric care, the main emphasis is on training mothers and volunteers in child care with a special focus on management of malnutrition and its causes. This is a major preventive step against the incidence of blinding malnutrition. The hospital has in-patient and out patient facilities. In addition the hospital with its medical team conducts frequent paediatric camps to promote immunization and bring the benefit of modern medicine to the poor.

Training Programmes

Post-Graduate Training

During the year 1984, the second batch of 4 students from our hospital passed Diploma in Ophthalmology (D. O.) course, of Madurai Kamaraj University. Out of the present batch of 9 students, 7 are due to appear for the exams to be conducted in April 1985.

TrainingProgramme for foreign nationals

Maldives: Two ophthalmic assistants, Miss. Arifa Yousuf and Miss. Fawzia Mohamed from Maldives had successfully under gone ophthalmic nursing course from April 1984 to Nov. 1984.

Africa: Mr. H.K. Godia, and Mr. H. D. Mkandawire from Malawi and Mr. John Macharia from Kenya were sent by Dr. Barrie Jones of Institute of the Ophthalmology, University of London for field training in Primary Eye Care from 3rd Dec. 84 to 30th January 85. Their trip was sponsored by Royal Common-wealth Society for the Blind.



Visits Abroad

Dr. G. Venkataswamy, Ms, FAMS, proceeded to European countries and U.S.A. in April 1984. He attended IAPB meeting at Helsinki (Finland) and took part in W.H.O. Collaborating Centre Workshop on "Community involvement in prevention of Blindness" held at International Centre for Eye Health, Department of Preventive Ophthalmology, University of London. He also attended the annual meeting of the Board of Directors, SEVA Foundation at U.S.A.

Dr. P. Namperumalsamy, MS; D. O., proceeded to U. S.A. in July 1984 to attend a meeting in connection with the project "Laboratory and Clinical Studies of Eale's Disease" under Indo-US Science and Technology Initiative.

Dr. G. Venkataswamy, MS, FAMS, proceeded to Rome (Italy) in December 1984 to attend the "International meeting of the Experts on Protocols in Epidemiology and Evaluation of Drugs intended for the treatment of Cataract" organised by the International Association for Cataract Related Researches (IACRR) in cooperation with World Health Organisation.

Projects

Training Child Care Workers :

A project for training a cadre of non-medical auxiliary workers for child care service is on with the help of Ford Foundation.

Eradication of Blinding Malnutrition in Madurai District :

The object of the project is to control xerophthalmia in the District of Madurai to the extent that malnutrition resulting in blindness will be eliminated, i. e. to achieve zero incidence of malnutritional blindness. This project comes under IMPACT INDIA SOUTH with the financial assisstance of RCSB, U.K.

Clinical Trials to reduce Hospital Stay of Patients Operated for Cataract :

A two year study of the safety and efficacy of using (Vanadium Stainless Steel) VSS-50 micron sutures for cataract surgery. In addition to drastically reducing the cost of sutures, the procedure has the potential of decreasing hospitalization stay from 5-7 days to 2-3 days.

Laboratory and Clinical Studies of Eale's Diesease

This project has been launched under the Indo-US Science and Technology Initiative, sponsored by Indian Council of Medical Research in collaboration with the Madurai Kamaraj University.

Operations Research:

To optimise the use of available ophthalmic resources by finding methods to overcome the social and economic barriers to cataract surgery in particular and eye care in general.





Rapid Survey Techniques for Ophthalmic Health Planning and Monitoring:

The object is to develop and test a method for diagnosing cataract blindness using para-professional health workers and analizing the data on stand alone microcomputers.

Management of Diabetic Retinopathy and Blindness Due to Diabetes :

Over a period of 5 years detailed follow up will be made on patients with diabetes in relation to the duration of diabetes, treatment, presence of other systemic illnesses such as hypertension, condition of the eye, response to the eye treatment given, etc.

Management of Post-Operative Endophthalmitis :

The study proposes to document and analyse the surgical management of cases with post-operative complications, especially endophthalmitis by using vitrectomy and other procedures.

Aravind in Neighbouring Countries



MALDIVES: At the request of World Health Organisation, Aravind Eye Hospital conducted the second eye camp at Maldives in January 1984. In this camp 1622 patients were screened and out of them 158 were operated. A total of 2326 school children were examined on various days.



NEPAL: On the request of SEVA Foundation, USA, Aravind Eye Hospital sent 3 doctors to Nepal to help them in their prevention of blindness programme.
